Report Cards – PLEASE NOTE

Conferences

Parent-Teacher conferences are scheduled for December $6^{th} - 8^{th}$. Each teacher will share your child's social and academic progress thus far. Teachers will also focus in on areas that are in need of growth during this school year. Please note that we will have a 12:30 dismissal on all three conference dates. December 6^{th} and 8^{th} will be afternoon conferences while December 7^{th} has been designated as evening conferences.

Conflict Resolution

Children in the early years are faced with a number of problems in a typical day. Learning to solve them is a desirable skill to teach children. Solving problems involves critical thinking, which carries over into academic areas as well.

What we are doing in school: Conflict Resolution

Our students are taught the "Win – Win Guidelines" at school.

- 1. Take time for cooling off if needed. Find alternative ways to express anger.
- 2. Each person states their feelings and the problem as they see it using "I Messages". No blaming, no name calling, no interrupting.
- 3. Each person states the problem as the other person sees it.
- 4. Each person says how they are responsible for the problem.
- 5. Brainstorm solutions together and choose a solution that satisfies both a Win/Win solution.
- 6. Affirm, forgive or thank your partner.

At F.N. Brown school we view problems as opportunities to learn. Helping your child solve problems increases his or her independence. Capable children solve problems effectively. Conflict Resolution began as a school initiative a couple of years ago at our school. We are very proud of our work up to this point and we are viewed as the district pioneers with this approach. A committee of staff members, representing each of the other elementary schools, attended the Conflict Resolution training sponsored by the New Jersey State Bar Foundation during last school year. This is the same training that our school committee attended a few years ago. The goal for the other elementary schools this year is to explore, learn and apply this initiative at each Verona elementary school respectively. This is very exciting! FNB will continue to work on this initiative and continue to implement the next phase focused on *Peer Mediation*.

Our Character Education committee spearheading the Conflict Resolution and Peer Mediation approaches is comprised of the following staff members: Mrs. Collins, Mr. Hill, Dr. Lanzo, Mrs. Tully, Mr. Waibel and Ms. Witter.

How home and school can continue to work together:

You can support problem solving at home by using the steps listed above with your child. In addition, you can help by giving your child space to solve his or her problems wherever possible. Acknowledge when you see your child effectively solving a problem and label it as such. When you allow your child to solve problems, you are communicating your confidence in his or her abilities and competence.

It is an honor and a pleasure to serve as your child's school principal. Enjoy the rest of fall!

ACTIVITIES AT F.N. BROWN SCHOOL

MS. CONNALLON'S CLASS

The Fall season is flying by! We have been so hard at work in our classroom. In our Reading Workshop we are building our stamina, fluency, accuracy, and learning to read with expression! Continue logging your baggie books each night! When reading, encourage your child to use expression! When you see a question mark your voice goes up, an exclamation marks shows excitement, bolded words/italicized are expressive! We have started our guided reading groups, when the student or small group sits with me and we work on a special targeted skill, based on their individual needs. First graders are going to learn "super hero reading strategies" soon and this will teach them self-help skills when they encounter a word they are not familiar with while reading.

In Writing Workshop, we have just finished writing our small moments! We zoomed in on a specific memory and used details to write it. I am strongly encouraging children to write with more details, by adding verbs and adjectives.

Second grade math has been a basic review of previously taught concepts. Our next topic will cover working with equal groups and we will introduce place value. First grade math has been introduce to part, part, whole. Our next topic will cover number relationships followed by addition and subtraction concepts.

In Fundations, our first graders are hard at work identifying beginning, middle and end sounds and blending them together to create words. Second graders have been introduced to welded sounds that are exceptions to the rules (ild, old, ost, olt) and vowel teams- "when two vowels go walking, the first one does the talking." If you encounter these words and spelling patterns while reading point them out!

Please continue to complete homework packet, at your convenience, and return the homework book and checklist on Fridays.

KINDERGARTEN – CATHERINE ORSINI, MARIA PERRI & MICHELE STARANKA

Turtle Back Zoo was awesome!! Everyone had a great time at the zoo and traveling on the bus. It was great to see the most recent addition to the zoo - the giraffes!

Our FN Brown Halloween Parade was SO much fun! It was great to see all the students and teachers in their costumes, and all the relatives and friends who came to see us. Thank you to our class parents for their help, our classroom parties were also a big hit.

In Reading Workshop, we are practicing reading independently and reading with our partners. Sight words have taken over our classrooms! Please continue to reinforce them at home as well. Reading and rereading emergent storybooks has helped us learn to "read the pictures"

In Writing Workshop, we are using illustrations to convey meaning, and will begin writing stories that reflect "small moments" in our lives. We are learning that using detail in our illustrations is very important in helping the reader understand what is happening in our story.

In Math, we are comparing and ordering numbers 0 through 10. Vocabulary such as "greater than", "less than", and "same as" is being used to describe the relationship between 2 groups. Continue to practice writing the numbers to 10.

Our first FN Brown Thanksgiving Feast is upon us! There are so many things we are thankful for, including our families, friends and FN Brown...Best School In Town!! Happy Thanksgiving Everyone!!

FIRST GRADE – ANNA COLLINS & NINA SIVOLELLA (ERICA MC KENNA)

October has been quite a busy month for our first graders. They are now ready for the full day and have stopped asking, "when is it time to go home or how much longer until the day is over?" The adjustment has been made by most of them. Also a warm welcome goes out to Miss Nina Sivolella who has made a wonderful transition and is working arduously to help each member of her class be the BEST student he or she can be.

They have all enjoyed their very first Writer's Celebration as first graders. Each class got to read their first published piece to another class. Mrs. Collins' students read to Mrs. Pellegrino's class and Miss Sivolella's students read to Mrs. Collins' class. Listening to others stories encourages speaking in front of an audience as well as help some students write better or even try new topics. Both classes had a wonderful time sharing. They enjoyed using the light speed sound amplification systems as well! The current writing unit is on "Small Moments" where students write with more detail about one given situation, feeling, time or memory. This is such an interesting time in writing to watch them progress as authors. The students begin to realize writing is a communication tool and is actually quite fun! Please help your child by reminding him or her of some of the wonderful experiences just from this past summer to jog their memories. Personal narratives as we as adults refer to it, are always so exciting for them to write and share. Some children along with their parent's encouragement, have written these ideas into their homework pad, which is a tremendous resource.

In math we are working on a unit with subtraction. Students need to have a firm handle on addition to be able to see the relationship to subtraction. Please review these concepts by looking over your child's daily math skill sheet. We have been focusing on math vocabulary in class as well as "key words" especially when it comes to word problems. Some vocabulary words you may hear your child using are: join, part-part-whole, addend, difference, equals, fewer than, more than, and many more.

Reading as a whole group as well as independently has kept our reading time very interesting. The students love to choose their own reading literature. This acts as a motivation for some and a challenge for others. Students are being encouraged to read information that interests them as well as be assigned specific reading materials to learn a given skill. Reading using context clues, making predictions and using reading Super Powers have been taught to show what good readers do before, during and after reading.

In Fundations, the children have reviewed all 26 of the letter sounds as well as have reviewed the short vowel sounds. They have learned what a CVC word is and that in most cases the vowel in the middle makes a short vowel sound. Your child has also learned about digraphs. A digraph is two consonants together which make one sound. The consonant digraphs are: th, wh, sh, ch, and ck. All of the students learned that "ck" will only ever come at the end of a word after a short vowel sound. They also learned that "wh" will only come at the beginning of a word. There are lots of spelling "rules" that your child is learning to become an independent speller. This is a process and it does take time. Please continue daily word ring practice too.

All the students enjoyed their first field trip to Farmstead Estate in Ringwood, New Jersey. The students liked learning about all the farm animals, eating lunch outdoors, riding on a school bus and receiving a pumpkin too.

At home you can continue to help your child become an independent learner by asking him or her to make connections to their reading, remind them to always be respectful and remember to have patience. Thank you parents.

SECOND GRADE – MARIA GRAZIANO & NANCY HISCANO

We have our first trip scheduled for November 22 to the The Morris Museum. The students will enjoy two programs: NJ Nature Walk and Earth Explorers. Students will have the opportunity to explore the museum and take part in hands on activities based on the topics they learn. We look forward to being able to touch and explore genuine animal artifacts and fossils.

In Reading Workshop we have moved from our Launching Unit into a Fiction Unit. We will be learning about the different genres of fiction including- realistic fiction, fantasy fiction, and traditional literature (folktales). We continue to work on our stamina, confidence, fluency, and comprehension. We have read some great stories such as <u>Tony's Bread</u>, <u>Little Red Riding Hood- A New Fangled Prairie Tale</u>, and <u>A Sick Day for Amos McGee</u>. We have worked on our retelling skills after reading our own "just right" books. It is important to practice retelling while reading at home as well.

We are having a great time in Writing Workshop as we explore writing realistic fiction stories. The students have come up with characters just like themselves and are writing a story based on the fictional writing format: characters, setting, problem, and solution.

In Math we have just completed our review topics on addition, subtraction, strategies and word problems. Many students still need to practice their basic facts up to 20 for speed and accuracy. Please continue to review these

facts at home often. We are currently working with equal groups by looking at repeated addition and arrays. After that, we will move on to Place Value to 100.

In Science, we are having a great time working in teams on various experiments to explore matter and changes. Some of experiments that students will conduct are Freezing and Melting, Mixing and Separating Solids, and Mixing Solids and Liquids. Each will have a hands on task to perform and will make observations based on the changes they see. We meet as a class to discuss our findings.

THIRD GRADE – MEGAN PELLEGRINO & KAREN SABATINO

The school year is progressing rapidly, the leaves are changing, and so are the students as they become more accustomed to third grade routines!

We are exploring the relationship between addition and subtraction in Math. We are adding and subtracting numbers within 1000, based on place value, properties of operations, and mental math strategies. Students should continue practicing to master addition and subtraction facts. Multiplication is only weeks away!

In Reading Workshop, students are learning about the many types of Fiction. Students are beginning to understand that all types of fiction genres contain story elements and common themes. Specific reading skills such as inferring, visualizing, summarizing, and making connections, are the focus of instruction to increase student comprehension, and engagement with the texts they read. Thinking Stems are used to help students raise their level of thinking and responding to their reading.

Students are immersed in the writing process, composing Personal Narratives about special moments and memories in their lives, spent with special people, places and events of importance. Grammar and mechanics are reinforced in weekly lessons and the editing process. Writing complete sentences, simple, compound and complex, using descriptive language, and correct capitalization and punctuation, are key in developing strong writing skills. Students are striving to use active verbs and strong leads to Show not Tell, about their life experiences.

Social Studies during an election year is always more exciting when learning about the democratic process! Students learned facts about each candidate, political parties, issues and party platforms. Students voted in a nationwide kids poll, through Scholastic News. They brainstormed character traits important for a good leader, then highlighted their own strengths, talents, and personality traits to create posters entitled "Candidates for a Great Class". On Election Day, students in every grade level, under the direction of Mrs. Pellegrino, will vote in a school wide Election. We will anxiously await the final decision to see if our school results predict the actual outcome!

Students are enjoying building their own vehicles in our Motion and Design Science Unit. Students make predictions, observations, and draw conclusions through this hands on approach. This enables students to discover Newton's laws of Motion through trial and error and the experimental process.

Chromebooks allow learning to continue beyond the classroom. Through Google Classroom activities students are engaged in the learning process through websites, videos and game activities that enhance and expand concepts introduced in class.

We are so grateful for our wonderful FN Brown community and wish all of our students and families a great month ahead, and a Happy Thanksgiving!

FOURTH GRADE – MARY ANN FORCE & LOU WAIBEL

Writer's workshop is full under way. Students are growing in their repertoire of strategies. They are continuing to collect entries, which inspire them to create a story. They have been studying and creating leads and discovering how they can be a link to the heart of the story. Students are also sharing and conferencing with their peers becoming "writing teachers" Celebrations of stories has become a highlight enabling students to share their writings with pride.

In Science students are continuing to study rocks and minerals. Students are exploring the properties of rocks by conducting tests and sorting them on the basis of observable properties. This topic enables students to

see the connection between the properties of a single substance, such as a mineral, and a mix of substances such as a rock.

In math, fourth graders have begun Topic 4. Students are learning how to use mental math to add or subtract, estimate sums and differences of whole numbers and subtracting across zeroes. Students are also practicing how to solve multistep word problems posed with whole numbers using the four, including problems in which remainders must be interpreted.

In Social Studies, students have continued to explore the regions of New Jersey and what makes them unique. We have discovered the New Jersey is full of rich history and opportunities such as mining, proximity to cities, recreational opportunities, and state parks. In addition, students utilized Google classroom to explore latitude and longitude. To extend the lesson, students are in the process of creating their own latitude and longitude quiz for their peers to take! Many quizzes have been uploaded to our Google classroom Social Studies page.

Our Peace Pal program is in full gear. Fourth graders are leading our kindergarten and second graders in activities devoted to learning how to get along better with classmates as well as learning to talk about their thoughts and feelings in a group. Students are also learning how to solve problems and make healthy choices.

Our conflict resolution focus has been learning the difference between an "I" message as opposed to using a "You" message. Students are engaging in role playing problems that lead to conflict. As a result students are learning the difference between using these messages. It is so wonderful to see students practice their skills with one another! It's extremely gratifying.

MRS. SAPIENZA'S CLASS

October has been a fun and productive month in our classroom. I am so proud to say that all students are working their hardest in all areas. We have worked on becoming a classroom community that looks out for and encourages each other, practices Conflict Resolution skills, if needed, and respects differences.

Math skills have been building upon each other. We began the year studying place value and then used that understanding to compare numbers. We then used a variety of tools to help with rounding numbers. Place value understanding is also important to solve word problems which we are practicing using a specific procedure that focuses on determining which mathematical operation is needed to solve the problem.

In Writing Workshop students are continuing to work on using writing as a form of communication. Each student wrote a brief personal narrative. We are now in the middle of writing a personal memory, a "small moment" story, using the writing process of brainstorming ideas, adding details and drafting. Editing and revising will be done with adult support to finalize a published text. I have emphasized that writing a story can be related to telling a story orally. As I model the writing process and work with students to come up with possible ideas I get to share stories from my own life as well as hear stories from students' lives. These opportunities also foster a sense of community within our classroom.

In Reading Workshop, the current unit focus is fiction. We are distinguishing fiction from nonfiction and learning about the characteristics of realistic fiction, fantasy fiction, fairy tales and folktales. We also are learning how to respond to text and make text connections. Types of text connections we have learned about include text to self, text to text, text to world and text to media.

We are looking forward to continuing to develop math skills and writing more detailed and interesting texts!

PHYSICAL EDUCATION – ROB HILL

This is shaping up to be a very exciting year in the physical education world here at F.N. Brown. The $2^{nd}-4^{th}$ graders have been working on their soccer skills such as dribbling, trapping, passing and shooting. The Kindergarten and 1^{st} graders are working on various locomotor skills, pathways and levels and will be utilizing these skills during various games in the weeks to come.

More importantly all of the children have been working very hard on their sportsmanship and teamwork skills. The difference from the first week of school until now is amazing. I am so proud of how they are learning

to work together as part of a team. I can only hope that this is rubbing off on all aspects of their lives. I am excited to see the ongoing development of these skills this year.

Just a friendly reminder for all parents, please make sure that your children have sneakers with them on days that they have physical education. There is nothing worse then having to tell a child that they can't participate because they don't have safe footwear on. Uggs, boots, sandals or any open toe shoes are not safe to wear during our activities.

TECHNOLOGY – JEN HOGAN

Students have begun mastering their mouse skills while completing activities that help reinforce the letter and number concepts they are learning in class. Our 2nd, 3rd and 4th Grade students have all joined our Technology Google Classroom. We have reviewed the parts and functions of the computer and completed some typing assignments. SPEECH – GILLIAN BETCHER

Speech and language students are having fun working on articulation and learning fall vocabulary. Going for a walk and playing I-Spy with the target speech sound is a fun way to enjoy the weather and practice articulation! Students requiring development in pragmatic language continue to work on "social thinking" skills, which will help them to be better communication partners. Expected versus unexpected behavior and the 5 point scale are being discussed to help students act appropriately in varying situations and express their emotions clearly. We are always working on building stronger social skills and peer interaction through game play. Siblings and parents are great speech models for students! They are learning to ask questions and make appropriate comments in order to improve the quality of their peer interactions. Reading stories and discussing holiday movies are a great way to develop stronger language skills. You can discuss the main idea, favorite characters, sequence of the story, major problem and how it was resolved. Have a beautiful autumn with family and friends!

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC – MAX MORDEN

Our 4th grade band students have been hard at work learning how to hold their instruments, shape their mouths (embouchure), where to place their hands and fingers, and how to use their air. Students should not be puffing cheeks. If you see this, remind them their cheeks should be flat. Along with all that they must learn to read the letters (pitch) and the note shape (rhythm). You can ask them about whole notes, half notes, and quarter notes. How many beats for each?

Learning an instrument is a very daunting task, and the real key to success is following through at home. All students are asked to do a short, *daily* practice routine. This is the most beneficial way for students to get a more thoroughly and efficient understanding. Students are only asked to practice for 10 minutes a day, but it is the *every day* part that is crucial. A longer period of time on a couple of days is considerably less helpful, and can actually be detrimental. Beginning students don't have enough stamina to sustain a long practice session, nor do they know enough material.

For our first concert, students are working on these songs: *Hot Cross Buns, Au Claire de la Lune, Merrily We Roll Along, Mad Dogs, Lightly Row, Good King Wenceslas, & Jingle Bells.* You should start recognizing these now. If you haven't heard any of these yet, it's not too late for them to learn, but time is running short. About 4 lessons remains until our concert. Remember, daily but short practice...

We look forward to our first performance. Dress is black pants or skirt, with a white shirt or blouse. Boys wear a tie of any style and design, and any type of shoes are acceptable.

<u>SPANISH – LUISA HIRSCH</u>

Bienvenidos a la clase de español! Welcome to Spanish class! Students are working very hard en la clase de español and I am very proud of the Spanish that they retained and remembered from last year. For the first grade students, this is the first time that they are receiving Spanish instruction and I am very impressed with their accomplishments so far. Students in first grade have learned what their name is in Spanish, how to introduce themselves, and how to answer How are you (Cómo estás) in Spanish as well as numbers from 1-12. Please have the students practice these concepts at home. Second grade students have learned how to speak to someone by asking them what their name is and how they are doing. They are using what they learned in first grade and applying it at a higher level to use it in conversation with their peers. Students in second grade are focusing on learning numbers up to 20 for this year. Second grade students should practice what they learned in class at home.

Third grade students have been learning the differences between greeting someone around their age vs. an adult in dialogue and verbal practice. Students have also learned other ways of answering How are you in Spanish. Also, students are currently working on their Hispanic Heritage projects honoring someone who is in Spanish using google classroom. Fourth grade students have reviewed how to greet an adult vs. someone their own age and are applying it in dialogues in class. Students also participated in a Hispanic Heritage Month Scavenger Hunt for students to have an awareness of why knowing Spanish is so important and how much the Spanish culture has influenced the American society in language, food, music, art, television, sports, etc. Students in third and fourth grade should share and speak the Spanish that they learn in class for practice.
